Beware scam to get your bank card

about "courier scams" - a despicable way that thieves are targeting elderly people in their own homes and robbing them of their money. Courier scams have been around for a number of vears, but are becoming increasingly prevalent in east London. The scam operates by fraudsters calling people at home, pretending to be from their bank or the police, and telling them their bank account has been compromised. The person may be asked to ring the bank back using the phone number printed on the back

of their bank card. This helps to convince the person that the call is genuine. However, the fraudster has kept the telephone line open so even though the person has called the bank, the call does not go through. Instead they are unknowingly connected straight back to the fraudster.

The fraudster then gains the person's trust by pretending to be from the bank and seeming to offer assistance. In many cases the person is asked to provide their full bank card details and key in their PIN so that their existing card can be "cancelled" and

"authorised." The fraudster will then explain that the bank will need to collect the card. The fraudster will attend the person's address or send an innocent courier company driver to collect the card and sometimes provide them with a "replacement" card which is subsequently found to be fake. Therefore, the fraudster has obtained the person's name, address, full bank details, the card itself and the PIN. The bank cards are then used fraudulently without the victim's knowledge.

Your bank or the police will never ask for your PIN

Asbo man cannot go into Westfield centre with a drink for two years

A minimum two-year Anti-Social Behaviour Order (Asbo) covering Westfield shopping centre has been imposed on a man for the protection of the public.

Valentine issued with it at the Central Criminal Court early last

He was found to have acted in a way which caused or

was likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to members of the public.

Under the order Valentine cannot enter Westfield or areas bounded by Great Eastern Road and The Broadway.

In addition to this he cannot be in possession of an open container of alcohol in any

public place, in a state of drunkenness in any public place in England and Wales or consume alcohol in a public place other than licensed premises.

Anyone who witnesses him breaching any of the conditions are urged to report it to their safer neighbourhood police team on 0208 721 272 or dial 101.

Ways to beat number plate and bike thieves

■ Number plate theft Newham police are reminding car owners that vehicle number plate theft is a national problem and has increased in recent years in part due to an increase in speed cameras, a rise in petrol costs and charges to use

certain roads.
Offenders look at ways of hiding the identities of their vehicles so they can engage in criminal activity without being detected.

Number plates are being stolen from vehicles of all makes, models and ages.

Non reversible screws have been developed to help combat this crime.

The number plate screws are special one-way devices that cannot be unscrewed once fitted. Any attempt to steal the plate would require force, causing the plate to

■ Bicycle theft

Register your bike at www. immobilise.com. It only takes a couple of minutes and it is free.

All you need is your bicycle model, make and frame number. Once you have registered your bike, you will have a better chance of getting it back if it is lost or stolen. You can also register other property at the same time, for example your mobile phones or laptop.

If you can't find your bike frame number, have a look:

Underneath the pedals on the bottom of the frame.

On the frame near the handlebars.

On the frame where the seat post fits.

On the frame towards the back wheel.

If your bike is stolen, report it to the police on 101 and flag it as stolen on your account as soon as possible.

Reporting your bike as lost or stolen helps the police match its description and return it to you.

If your bike is recovered and you have registered it you will be contacted and told your cycle is safe.
